CINEMA TROPICAL FESTIVAL SHOWCASES THE BEST LATIN AMERICAN FILMS OF 2014

Five Cinema Tropical Award-winning films to screen, including Manolo Nieto's *The Militant* (Uruguay), Sebastián Sepúlveda's *The Quispe Girls* (Chile), Gustavo Fontán's *The Face* (Argentina), Rodrigo Reyes's *Purgatorio* (U.S.), and Cristina Ibarra's *Las Marthas* (U.S.)

Astoria, New York, February 5, 2015—This weekend, February 6 through 8, Museum of the Moving Image and Cinema Tropical, the leading presenter of Latin American cinema in the United States, will screen five films that won Cinema Tropical Awards for the best Latin American films of 2014. They include:

- Best Latin American Film of the Year: *The Militant* (Uruguay) by Manolo Nieto
- Best First Film: The Quispe Girls (Chile) by Sebastián Sepúlveda
- Best U.S. Latino Film (tie): Las Marthas by Cristina Ibarra
- Best U.S. Latino Film (tie): *Purgatorio: Journey into the Heart of the Border* by Rodrigo Reyes
- Best Director of a Fiction Film: Gustavo Fontán for The Face (Argentina)

The films were selected by a jury panel composed by Daniela Alatorre, producer, Morelia Film Festival; Gustavo Beck, filmmaker and film programmer; Marcela Goglio, film programmer; Lucila Moctezuma, Executive Producing Director UnionDocs; Tamir Muhammad, Director Content and Artists Development for Time Warner; Rachael Rakes, film programmer; José Rodriguez, Manager, Documentary Programming, Tribeca Film Institute; Bernardo Ruiz, filmmaker; and Naief Yehya, film and culture critic, writer.

The Militant (El lugar del hijo)

Friday, February 6, 7:00 p.m.

Winner of Best Fiction Film at the 5th Annual Cinema Tropical Awards

Dir. Manolo Nieto. Uruguay/Argentina. 2013. 129 mins. With Sebastian Blanquer, Rosana Cabrera, Maria Pia D'Andrea, Felipe Dieste. In Spanish with English subtitles. A university student involved in militant leftist activism is faced with difficult decisions when his father suddenly dies, leaving him in charge of their troubled ranch and forcing him to take on the role of a middle class bourgeois. Set in 2002—the year of a major financial crisis in the small South American nation—*The Militant* is "a cinematic essay on the grasp and the limits of activism" (Howard Feinstein, *Screen Daily*).

Purgatorio: A Journey into the Heart of the Border

Saturday, February 7, 3:00 p.m.

Winner of Best U.S. Latino Film at the 5th Annual Cinema Tropical Awards

Dir. Rodrigo Reyes. U.S. 2012. 86 min. In Spanish with English subtitles. Rodrigo Reyes's provocative essay film reimagines the U.S./Mexico border as a mythical place comparable to Dante's purgatory. By capturing a stunning mosaic of compelling characters and broken landscapes on both sides of the border, Reyes–one of *Filmmaker* magazine's New Faces of Independent Cinema–reflects on the flaws of human nature and the powerful absurdities of the modern world.

Las Marthas

With director Cristina Ibarra in person

Saturday, February 7, 6:00 p.m.

Winner of Best U.S. Latino Film at the 5th Annual Cinema Tropical Awards

Dir. Cristina Ibarra. U.S. 2014. 68 min. In Spanish and English with English subtitles. In 1939, the Society of Martha Washington was founded to usher each year's debutantes (called "Marthas") into proper society at the Colonial Pageant and Ball in Laredo, Texas. Celebrated as "a striking alternative portrait of border-town life" (*The New York Times*), the film follows two Mexican-American girls carrying this gilded tradition on their shoulders during a time of economic uncertainty and tension over immigration.

The Quispe Girls (Las niñas Quispe)

Sunday, February 8, 3:00 p.m.

Winner of Best First Film at the 5th Annual Cinema Tropical Awards

Dir. Sebastián Sepúlveda. Chile. 2013. 80 min. With Alfredo Castro, Francisca Gavilán, Digna Quispe, Catalina Saavedra. In Spanish with English subtitles. In the remote, almost primeval world of a Chilean mountainscape in 1974, three goat-herding sisters survive, after the death of a fourth sister. Pinochet's rise to power is a distant echo, and the new dictator's edict against herding threatens their meager livelihood. Using a mix of actors (including Catalina Saavedra from *The Maid*) and non-actors, including Digna Quispe, the real sisters' niece, this mesmerizing film, based on a true and tragic story, tells an intimate tale against a stark yet magnificent landscape. *The Quispe Girls* made its U.S. debut as part of the Museum's First Look showcase in 2014.

The Face (El rostro)

Sunday, February 8, 6:00 p.m.

Winner of Best Director, Fiction Film at the 5th Annual Cinema Tropical Awards

Dir. Gustavo Fontán. Argentina. 2012. 64 min. With Pedro Gabas, María del Huerto Ghiggi, Gustavo Hennekens, and Héctor Maldonado. New York premiere. In Spanish with English subtitles. *The Face* is a lyrical and personal film shot in stunning black and white, where past and present, fiction and nonfiction mix together. A man who sails alone approaches an island on the Paraná River. Once he lands, he's no longer alone. He shares a meal with another man—his father. There will also be a woman. And some kids. And nature—in the form of birds, plants, and the river, which is always present through its quietness and constant flowing. The film was a selection of the Rome Film Festival and was awarded the Best Director prize at the Buenos Aires Independent Film Festival (BAFICI).
