MOMI PRESENTS U.S. THEATRICAL PREMIERE ENGAGEMENT OF VITALY MANSKY'S 'CLOSE RELATIONS'

The new documentary from the director of *Under the Sun* explores the Russia-Ukraine conflict through visits to the filmmaker's extended family in Ukraine

September 22-October 1, 2017

Astoria, Queens, New York, September 6, 2017—Museum of the Moving Image will present the U.S. theatrical premiere engagement of *Close Relations* (*Rodnye*), Vitaly Mansky's follow-up to his award-winning documentary *Under the Sun*, from September 22 through October 1, 2017. In *Close Relations*, Mansky turns his focus to his home country of Ukraine, offering an intimate look at the complexities of national identity in the aftermath of the Maidan uprising and national election in 2014 and ongoing conflict with Russia. As both a Russian citizen and native Ukrainian, Mansky deftly underscores personal and political complexities as he visits with relatives living in Lvov, Odessa, the Crimean peninsula (newly annexed by Russia), and the Donbass region—still an active war zone—and in the process discovers a wide and disorienting spectrum of outlooks and affiliations, including his own sense of ongoing exile and unease. *Close Relations* is at once an intimate family portrait and a graceful journalistic endeavor, a movie of the intense present that illuminates a place caught between a troubled past and an anxious future.
