Astoria, Queens, New York, March 29, 2017—This April, Museum of the Moving Image will offer family programs anchored by *Set Sail with Moana*, a pairing of big-screen showings of the Disney animated feature *Moana* and the "Heroic Odyssey" mediamaking workshop, during spring recess for New York City public schools, April 10 through 17. April also sees the return of the Moving Image Studio, the Museum's drop-in mediamaking space, every Saturday through June 24 (with the exception of April 15). In addition, the Museum will present a selection of films for older children as part of the Museum's ongoing Martin Scorsese series, and, exclusively for teens, the Teen Digital Media Lab on select Friday afternoons. Throughout this period, families are also welcome to visit the Museum's galleries to experience *Behind the Screen*, the Museum's dynamic hands-on exhibition that explores how movies, television shows, and digital entertainment are made, marketed, and shown.

Tickets for screenings are \$15 adults, \$11 seniors and students, \$7 children 3–12, and free for children under 3 and Museum members at the Film Lover and MoMI Kids Premium levels and above. Dirs. Ron Clements, John Musker. 2016, 107 mins. DCP. With the voices of Auli'i Cravalho, Dwayne Johnson. Featuring songs by Mark Mancina, Opetaia Foa'l, and Lin-Manuel Miranda, including the Academy Award nominated "How Far I'll Go." Daughter and heir to the island chief, Moana sets sail across the Pacific Ocean in search of the legendary demi-god, Maui, in the hope of saving her people and their home. During their adventure across the ocean, *Moana* faces monsters and learns to be a wayfinder like her Polynesian ancestors. Recommended for ages 5+

Dirs. Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger. 1948, 134 mins. **Restored 35mm print**. With Anton Walbrook, Marius Goring, Moira Shearer. The story of a ballerina who becomes consumed by her obsession with her art was realized by Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger with obsessive attention to the power of cinematic expression. The ultimate film about the way that art can take over life, *The Red Shoes* was recently restored, fittingly, with obsessive perfectionism. Thanks to this truly eye-opening restoration, which employed a state-of-the-art blend of photochemical and digital technology, *The Red Shoes* has never looked better. Dirs. Bibo Bergeron, Vicky Jenson, Rob Letterman. 2004, 90 mins. DCP. With Will Smith, Robert De Niro, Renée Zellweger, Jack Black, Angelina Jolie, Martin Scorsese. This worldwide box office smash from DreamWorks Animation provided Martin Scorsese with one of his biggest acting roles. Working alongside longtime collaborator Robert De Niro, he provides the voice of Sykes, the pufferfish of Reef City who is both the shady owner of the Whale Wash and a loan shark. In debt to Sykes for "five thousand clams," young Oscar (Will Smith) borrows and schemes to pay him back, but keeps getting sidetracked by his dreams. (Part of the Martin Scorsese retrospective)

India. Dirs. Shirley Abraham, Amit Madheshiya. 2016, 96 mins. In Hindi and Marathi with English subtitles. Every year, for three quarters of a century, showmen have brought the wonders of cinema to faraway Indian villages via rickety, multi-purpose trucks. Yet now the tradition is threatened as cinema projectors crumble, film reels become scarce, and patrons are lured by slick digital technology. In this bittersweet paean to an endangered film culture, a benevolent showman, a shrewd exhibitor and a maverick projector mechanic lovingly strive keep the last traveling cinemas of the world alive and running. The movie follows the owners and tenants of an East Village apartment building. Threatened by a nearby development project, the building can only be saved with help from space aliens. Presented as part of People Preserving Place" A Film Festival. Recommended for ages 8+
