Great Adaptations opens Saturday, May 21, with a special preview screening of Judy Moody and the Not Bummer Summer featuring stars Jordana Beatty (Judy Moody) and Parris Mosteller (Stink Moody) and author/screenwriter Megan McDonald in person for introductions and discussion. The advance screening is courtesy of Relativity Media which will open the film in theaters on June 10. A book and poster signing will follow in the Museum store. For children five and older, the series also offers *A Little Princess*, Alfonso Cuaron's 1995 screen adaptation of Frances Hodgson Burnett's classic tale about a young girl at boarding school who is forced to live a life of servitude when her father disappears on the battlegrounds of World War I. For tweens and teens, the series includes the new version of *True Grit*, starring Academy Award-nominated Hailee Steinfeld and directed by the Coen brothers; Marjane Satrapi's *Persepolis*; the underrated comedy *Flipped* by Rob Reiner based on the novel by Wendelin van Draanen; Wes Anderson's meticulously crafted stop-motion animation *Fantastic Mr. Fox*, based on the Roald Dahl story; and the comic book adaptation *Scott Pilgrim vs. the World*.
