JIM HENSON'S CHARACTERS TAKE CENTER STAGE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON IN SCREENINGS AT MUSEUM OF THE MOVING IMAGE

Part of the new monthly series Jim Henson's World

Astoria, New York, (updated December 5, 2013)—The imaginative, playful, and creative film and television work of Jim Henson will be celebrated every month by Museum of the Moving Image in the screening series *Jim Henson's World*, often featuring personal appearances by Henson's colleagues. Over the holidays, these screenings—a Rowlf TM retrospective over Thanksgiving and daily showings of *Emmet Otter's Jug-Band Christmas*TM over Christmas—will also be complemented by family workshops focused on puppetry.

On December 8, the Museum will present a special screening of *Emmet Otter*, accompanied by guest speakers, as a tribute to two Henson colleagues who died in the past year: the beloved puppeteer and special effects designer Franz "Fazakas and longtime producer Diana Birkenfield. Please see below for descriptions and schedule.

In 2015, the Museum will open a permanent gallery devoted to the work of Jim Henson that will showcase many of the puppets, costumes, and other production materials, which were donated to the Museum by the family of Jim Henson.

Tickets for screenings are included with paid Museum admission (\$12 adults / \$9 seniors and students / \$6 children 3–12 / free for Museum members); there is a materials fee for participating in the workshop. Museum members may reserve tickets in advance.

Programs in the series *Jim Henson's World*TM are organized by Craig Shemin, President of The Jim Henson Legacy. The Legacy is a non-profit 501(C)3 organization that is dedicated to preserving and perpetuating Jim Henson's contributions to the worlds of puppetry, television and motion pictures, special effects and media technology. FAMILY WORKSHOP

Holiday Puppet Party Workshop

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 21-MONDAY, DECEMBER 23; THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26-TUESDAY, JANUARY 1, 2:15 P.M. AND 3:30 P.M. DAILY

Recommended for ages 7 and older. Kids become puppet makers and performers in this hour-long holiday workshop. Using simple materials, children will design their own unique characters. Then, using techniques similar to those pioneered by the legendary puppeteer Jim Henson, they will take turns performing with them in a short televised puppet show.

Materials fee: \$10 per child (\$5 for Family-level Museum members.) Register at the admissions desk upon arrival at the Museum; spaces will be given out on a first-come, first-served basis.
