ON MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY, MOMI SCREENS TWO FILMS ABOUT THE 1965 MARCHES FROM SELMA TO MONTGOMERY

Eyes on the Prize: Bridge to Freedom and Ava DuVernay's *Selma* screen back to back on Monday, January 18

Astoria, Queens, NY, January 13, 2016—To commemorate Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, Museum of the Moving Image will present screenings of two films about the marches from Selma to Montgomery that capture King's central role in leading the struggle for civil rights. On Monday, January 18, 2016, at 1:00 p.m., the Museum will screen *Eyes on the Prize: Bridge to Freedom*, the celebrated 1987 TV-miniseries episode about the marches from Selma to Montgomery, followed at 3:00 p.m. by Ava DuVernay's acclaimed 2014 film *Selma*, featuring David Oyelowo as King. The screening of *Bridge to Freedom* is free.

Henry Hampton's masterful series *Eyes on the Prize* is the most compelling and comprehensive documentary about the 1960s civil rights movement. This key episode offers an inside view of the march from Selma led by Martin Luther King, Jr. that was dramatized in Ava DuVernay's 2014 film.
