After fracturing his fibula in a 1987 game, former Romanian soccer star and current bureaucrat Laurenţiu Ginghină now dreams of radically revising his beloved sport's rules to reduce injuries and, in turn, revolutionize it. The latest from Romanian New Wave master Corneliu Porumboiu is a hilarious and incisive portrait of personal obsession. Po-faced Porumboiu plays the straight man to Ginghină's desk-jockey dreamer, encountering increasingly outlandish proposals that diminish in plausibility as they increase in emotional and philosophical resonance. After his Sundance award-winning documentary *Return to Homs*, Talal Derki returned to his Syrian homeland where he gained the trust of a radical Islamist family, sharing their daily life for over two years. His camera focuses primarily on the children, providing an extremely rare insight into what it means to grow up with a father whose only dream is to establish an Islamic caliphate. Thirteen-year-old Osama and his younger brother Ayman both love, admire, and obey their father, but while Osama seems content to follow the path of jihad, Ayman wants to go back to school. *Of Fathers and Sons* is a work of unparalleled intimacy that captures the chilling moment when childhood dies and jihadism is born. A fascinating work of cinema verite by Gordon Quinn and Gerald Temaner, co-founders of Kartemquin Films, and scored by Philip Glass, *Inquiring Nuns* follows two young nuns as they crisscross Chicago, approaching strangers on the street, as well as in parking lots, the Art Institute, and churches, asking the simple question, "Are you happy?" They meet a lonely girl, a happy mother, young lovers, hippie musicians, a sociologist, and even the actor Lincoln Perry, better known as Stepin Fetchit, now on hard times. Each interview is a complete and thoughtful piece of the person's life, with no intercutting. The humor and sadness of these honest encounters lift the film beyond its experimental conceit into a serious and moving inquiry into contemporary society and the circumstances under which people examine their lives.
