Indie film pioneers Melvin Van Peebles (Mar. 16) and Susan Seidelman (Mar. 19) in person with iconic works, plus the world premiere of the documentary *Saving Jamaica Bay* (Mar. 17)

Astoria, Queens, New York (February 9, 2016)—Museum of the Moving Image is pleased to be the premier venue for the 6th Annual Queens World Film Festival (QWFF), which will present 144 films from 23 countries from March 15 through 20, 2016. Additional QWFF venues include the Secret Theatre, P.S. 69, and the All Saints Episcopal Church. The Museum will partner with QWFF in presenting three spotlight events in the majestic Sumner M. Redstone Theater, featuring appearances by pioneering independent filmmakers **Melvin Van Peebles** (with *Sweet Sweetback's Baadasssss Song*, on March 16) and **Susan Seidelman** (*Smithereens*, on March 19), and the world premiere of the documentary *Saving Jamaica Bay* (on March 17).
